OBJECTIVE AND DETAILS OF WORK: To do miscellaneous research and testing services in behavioral modification. Only two specific project proposals are contained in the file: The first is a proposal to study the possible synergistic action of drugs which may be appropriate for use in abolishing consciousness through animal experimentation, and, the second is a proposal for a survey of methods to enable the administration of drugs to patients without their knowledge. There is no record of project activity or results. Served as a contact and cut-out for projects in this field, primarily in the [REDACTED]. Also monitored selected projects located in the [REDACTED] area and served as a general consultant and adviser. In addition, [REDACTED] acted as medical adviser and consultant to Mr. Morgan Hall.

SIGNIFICANT ASPECTS: Animal testing is indicated in project proposals as a precondition to human testing. Human testing implied but money only requested for animal testing. MEMORANDUM FOR: THE RECORD

SUBJECT : Project MKULTRA, Subproject 2A 2

1. Subproject 2A is being initiated to provide a secure and efficient means of exploiting [redacted] with regard to the MKULTRA program.

2. [redacted] is a practicing psychiatrist in [redacted], and a faculty member of Stanford Medical School. He has been of value in the general MKULTRA project, serving as an advisor and consultant, contacting individuals in the [redacted] area, and carrying out his own research program.

3. Subproject 2A would include the following:

(a) Miscellaneous research and testing services in the general field of MKULTRA.

(b) Services as a contact and cutout for projects in the MKULTRA field, primarily those located in the [redacted] area.

(c) Monitoring of selected projects in the MKULTRA field, when located in the [redacted] area.

(d) Services as a general consultant and advisor in the MKULTRA field.

(e) He would act as medical advisor and consultant to Mr. Morgan Hall and his [redacted] establishment.

4. [redacted] will be reimbursed for his services and expenses upon receipt of an invoice at irregular intervals. When travel expenses are incurred through use of a common carrier, they will be documented and reimbursed in the usual manner; that is, consistent with standard Government allowances.

PROPOSAL.

Objective: To study the possible synergistic action of drugs which may be appropriate for use in abolishing consciousness.

Situation: There is reason to believe that two or more drugs, used in combination, are more effective than single drugs. The combined effect of some drugs, such as combinations of barbiturates, are known. With other combinations, the degree of synergism is not known. If considerable synergism is found to exist, two possibilities must be considered: (1) that a particularly useful combination may be found, and (2) that a particular combination may be hazardous because of its effect on respiration or some other vital function. To minimize hazards, animal experiments should precede human experiments.

Proposal: Allocation of \$1000 for animal experiments, to be drawn on as needed. That experiments be conducted informally at Stanford without a specific grant, and with appropriate cover.

OBJECTIVE AND DETAILS OF WORK: All three of these projects are to fund the contractor, a magician, to write a manual on the various aspects of the magicians' art which could be useful in covert operations. One aspect of this project was to develop skills which could be used by the working field case officer to surreptitiously place a pill or other item in an item to be consumed by a target personality -- for example, a drinker.

A contractor was employed under Sub-Project No. 34 to prepare a paper on magicians techniques for the covert communication of information.

Dr. Harold A. Abramson, who sponsored work at two locations:



OBJECTIVES AND DETAILS OF WORK:

This work started prior to MKULTRA with RD-37 in 1952 and was carried forward with Sub-Projects 7, 1953-1954; 27, 1954-1955, and 40, 1956. These projects seem to be the nucleus of the LSD program and the three were done at both locations. Dr. Abramson, as well as doing work himself, subcontracted research to other specialists. The first years' work seemed aimed at characterizing the various effects of LSD with the aim of ultimately producing a manual for field use. During Sub-Project No. 7, money was provided to sub-contract "work in the fields of brain enzyme and nerve metabolism." As an indication of the scope: "Another psychiatrist will independently analyze the verbatim recordings in over 100 experiments in which LSD-25 has already been given." Sub-Projects No. 27 continued the earlier emphasis to understand the total effects of LSD by studying "tissue metabolism" and LSD influence on embryological development. In addition, work was undertaken to look for LSD antidotes and blocking agents. Sub-Project No. 40 continued the previous work and added aerosol delivery studies. Basic documents on each of the three projects are attached.

APPROXIMATE TIME SPAN: 1952-1956

SIGNIFICANT ASPECTS: The work appears to be the necessary basic research on a drug whose impact on society was just beginning. The studies included the use of LSD in therapy. As far as is known, subjects in this experimentation were witting. Funds are included for the payment of subjects. Sub-Project No. 7's proposal contains the following quotation:

"One of the difficulties of determining explicitly the effect of the drug itself is that the subject and the observer are both conscious of the fact that an experiment is being performed. It is hoped that, in the next year, subjects on the [REDACTED] who are essentially normal from a psychiatric point of view, will be given unwitting doses of the drug for psychotherapeutic purposes. In this way more valuable experiments will probably be carried out in spite of hospital conditions."

It is not known whether unwitting, in this case, meant fully unwitting or unwitting as to timing. It is also unknown whether unwitting doses were actually given.

May I thank you for the interest shown by your Company in the project at [REDACTED]

I should like to enlist your aid, if I may, for continuation of the project along the following lines.

1. Aerosol Studies. The therapy of individuals by means of aerosols is of great significance in medicine. A hitherto unexplored area of aerosols is the delivery of nebulizers using nonaqueous solvents. It is proposed that studies be made of organic materials in non-aqueous solvents and their mixtures with water to determine nebulizer delivery over prolonged periods of therapy. (60 per cent of budget).

2. As you know, the blocking of LSD reactions has been claimed by many pharmaceutical houses, although none of these claims have really been substantiated. It is proposed that recent investigations by me on tissue extracts be further explored with a view toward discovering what it is in these extracts that blocks the LSD reaction, keeping in mind possible application of these compounds to experimental and clinical psychoses in man. It is understood that this part of the project will be discontinued December 31, 1956. (20 per cent of budget).

3. Continuation of studies on non-psychotic humans with a view toward maintaining a test group, as well as to provide experimental work in a frame of reference different from that frame of reference incorporated by items 1. and 2. of the foregoing. However, it shall be the primary purpose of the nonpsychotic test group to test the results obtained by items 1. and 2. (20 per cent of budget).

It is anticipated that the foregoing budget may be amplified by supplementary funds to be received from foundations.

The following is the proposed budget. Owing to the uncertainty of plans for the fiscal year 1956-1957, I should like, if possible, to have the privilege of utilizing the proposed budget to September 30, 1957 rather than to June 30, 1957.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Project MKULTRA, Subproject 7

1. The scope of subproject 7 is intended to include the work to be done with LSD and related materials by Dr. Harold A. Abramson at his two facilities for the period ending July 4, 1954. The project will continue to be handled through the Geschickter Foundation for cut-out and cover purposes. The proposal from Dr. Abramson to the Geschickter Foundation is attached to this memorandum.

2. Emphasis will be placed in this coming year on translating the basic data obtained to date into operationally pertinent material along the following lines:

- a. Disturbance of Memory
- b. Discrediting by Aberrant Behavior
- c. Alteration of Sex Patterns
- d. Eliciting of Information
- e. Suggestibility
- f. Creation of Dependence

It is planned to have the second year's work culminate in a compendium of information on this subject that will resemble an operational field manual as much as possible. All other CD/TSS project data that has a bearing on this subject will be used in the preparation of the manual.

3. The sum of money listed under Dr. Abramson's budget includes work in the fields of brain enzyme work and nerve metabolism to be subcontracted to other organizations.

4. The funds include \$45,650 for the project at [REDACTED], \$39,500 for Dr. Abramson's own project, and a 2% service charge for the Geschickter Foundation amounting to \$1703.00. Therefore, the total cost of this investigation will not exceed \$86,853.00 for the period from July 5, 1953 to July 4, 1954.

May I acknowledge with thanks the support of your Foundation for the previous year's research on LSD25. I should like to take this opportunity to apply for support for the fiscal year July 5, 1953 to July 4, 1954 to continue the research project on the effect of LSD25 on normal adults. The program for the following year is planned as follows:

Content analysis of the present data will be attempted by two psychiatrists. One of these psychiatrists will be the psychiatrist assigned to the project itself. This psychiatrist has observed the phenomena. Another psychiatrist will independently analyze the verbatim recordings in over 100 experiments in which LSD25 has already been given. A comparison of the two surveys will be made to evaluate not only the effects of the drug but the technique of the experimental procedures. The analysis of the data will first concern itself with the raw material and the significance of individual and group responses based on the raw material as presented by

further experiments on individual subjects will be carried out by the ~~psychiatrist~~ psychologist who, using both projective and non-projective media, forces externalization of the attitudes and conflicts of the personality ~~it is rapidly cutting through the various defenses~~. The quantitative and qualitative analysis of the test data will be correlated with the psychiatrist's study of the raw data to ascertain if the simple interview technique outlined to you in my report ~~of~~ of May 28, 1953 are supplemented or contradicted by our battery of tests:

- (1) The Wechsler-Bellevue Intelligence Scale
- (2) The Bender-Gestalt
- (3) The House-Tree-Person Test
- (4) The Rorschach
- (5) Word Association Test
- (6) Cards 1, 2, 3BP of the Thematic Apperception Test

Integrating the work of the psychiatrist who, as I have mentioned, is concerned with the raw data and the work of the psychologist who is concerned with the projective and non-projective testing will be the coordinating activities of the neurophysiologist. He will be studying the effect of the drug on perception and on motor activities. The steadiness test heretofore described, eye-hand coordination, reaction time to light and sound will be studied together with the variables described on the attached questionnaire as a function of time. My I acknowledge with thanks the support you have given the LSD project at [REDACTED] for the past two years and take this opportunity to discuss with you the possibility of obtaining a terminal grant for the project at [REDACTED] from July 4, 1954 to July 3, 1955. The program for 1953 previously submitted is well under way. It has been a pleasure to work directly with your representatives who have aided in implementing the many aspects of the program. Our data, however, have been accumulating very rapidly. So rapid is the accumulation of data that the personnel of the project are confronted with the serious problem of carrying out the program for 1953-1954 and simultaneously writing up the program covering experiments suitable for statistical analysis performed during the first fiscal year of the program.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Project MKULTRA, Subproject 27

1. Subproject 27 of Project MKULTRA is being established as a means of providing funds for a terminal grant to Dr. Harold A. Abramson and the [REDACTED] to complete their program of research on lysergic acid diethylamide. The money is to be used during the period July 4, 1954 to July 4, 1955. The funds will continue to be disbursed by the Geschickter Fund for Medical Research, for cover purposes.

2. A considerable volume of data has accumulated during the past two years from the actual experimental drug administration. During the third year of the project, all of this data will be compiled and analyzed. Also, experimental work will be continued along several lines, including work on potential antidotes, the desensitization reaction to LSD, the testing of materials structurally related to LSD, and several basic investigations on the mode of action of LSD.

3. The budget covers work to be done in two places, [REDACTED]. The attached proposal indicates the cost breakdown of the estimated expenditures.

4. The funds include \$42,460.00 for work at [REDACTED] and \$30,200.00 for [REDACTED] and a 4% service charge for the Geschickter Fund for Medical Research, amounting to \$2,506.40. P R O S P E C T U S

In the past three years of research with the drug LSD-25, we have developed reliable methods of analyzing social situations and interactions. Our progress in assessing personality types is useful in diagnosis and prediction. These methods are based on a multi-discipline assessment of personality in dynamic social adjustment under normal circumstances and under stress, i.e., drug effect, irrespective of the attributes of any specific drug.

The briefest phrase to characterize our main area of study is "social personality". A laboratory of experimental social psychiatry has been established in such a way that various types of personality and many situations may be subjected to critical study. For example, its methods can be applied to any specific problem such as the effects of LSD or other drugs like alcohol, on the improvement of interpersonal relations.

There are two important steps to be taken: (1) Completing the work in progress of personality types so we can define more clearly our social personality types and relate them to (a) the more standard, objective tests such as the Wechsler-Bellevue on which [REDACTED] theory of types is based, and (b) the conventional clinical projective tests such as the Rorschach and Thematic Apperception Tests; (2) Trying out the utility of these tests and special interview and questionnaire methods developed in the course of our studies for predicting specifiable change in social behavior following the ingestion of various drugs, particularly LSD and alcohol.

### Conclusion of LSD Study:

In the past four years of research with LSD-25 we have developed reliable methods of (a) analyzing social situations and interactions; (b) describing personality in terms of social adjustment, and (c) relating social situations and social personality types to the specific effects of LSD. Through this methodology it has been possible to identify some important determinants of drug effects which have not been previously considered in studies of LSD-25.

While we have made considerable progress in systematically studying these determinants, a certain amount of data analysis still remains to be completed before the determinants of the LSD-25 effect on individual cases can be reliably stated.

Therefore, the primary objective of this final phase of the project is to complete the analysis of data on all our subjects in order to define the extent that differences in certain effects can be accounted for by the above-mentioned determinants.

A second objective is to complete reports on some peripheral studies conducted with Scrpisil and certain other psychochemicals.

Dear Sidney:

After our telephone conversation this morning I went to the National City Bank of N.Y. (Wash. Sq. Branch) 72 Fifth Ave., and opened an account - regular checking - in the amount of \$100.00 using the name MORDEcai HALL.

It appeared to me that for sake of safety - for example, anything should happen to me - it would simplify matters if I made this a joint account between Hall and [redacted]. Then, in case of my absence, illness or death you could recover the joint funds without any legal difficulties or money business.

The bank was a little sticky about opening an account in the absence of "references" from another bank; and also found it hard to understand how Mr. Hall got by all these years without a bank account. However, I offered to provide an excellent reference in a government official, a Mr. Geo. White, who is the District Supervisor of the Bureau of Narcotics at Boston, and that seemed to placate the money-lenders. Thereafter, I communicated with White and he immediately wrote a reference for Hall on official stationery. Mr. White also kindly said he was well acquainted with Mr. Griffard and was pleased to offer for him a similar recommendation.

If you think this is a good idea, I suggest you sign the Joint Account Agreement and the three signature cards enclosed and return them to me.

And now that the account is opened I suggest you have funds deposited via Cashier's check - or any other way that seems easiest - directly to Mr. Hall's account.

I ordered checks printed with Mr. Hall's name thereon and have also ordered stationery bearing Mr. Hall's name. I considered this might facilitate payment of bills, etc., by mail.

What with suspicious banks, landlords, utility companies, etc., you will understand that creating the Jewell Hyde personality in the form of Mordecai Hall is taking a little "doing".

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT : Accountability for Certain Expenditures under  
Subproject 42 of MKULTRA

1. Subproject 42 was established in part to provide the Agency with a facility for conducting experiments involving the covert administration of physiologically active materials to unwitting subjects.

2. The facility was set up by providing Mr. Morgan Hall with a safehouse in San Francisco and furnishing him with the necessary materials and funds to carry out the approved program. Mr. Hall in turn carried out part of the program with the assistance of certain individuals who covertly administer this material to other people in accordance with his instructions. For their assistance in this program these individuals are paid small sums in cash at irregular intervals.

3. Due to the highly unorthodox nature of these activities and the considerable risk incurred by these individuals, it is impossible to require that they provide a receipt for these payments or that they indicate the precise manner in which the funds were spent.

4. These small expenditures by Mr. Hall will, therefore, appear as cash withdrawals from his account for which no receipt from the ultimate recipient will be required. Each of these operations will be reported upon in detail to the Chief, TSS/Chemical Division and individually will bear his approval when Mr. Hall submits his monthly accounting.

SUBJECT: Project MXULTRA, Subproject 42

1. Subproject 42 is to be continued for the same purposes as when originally established: to support Mr. Morgan Hall's covert and realistic field trials of certain research and development items of interest to TSD, and to maintain the physical facilities required for these trials.

2. In the past year a number of covert and realistic field trials have been successfully carried out. The results of these experiments have provided factual data essential to establishing protocols for a number of contemplated operations. A continuation of covert and realistic field trials are necessitated by the production of new materials in TSD programs, particularly in areas requiring detailed knowledge of the effectiveness and efficiency of delivery systems. Additional trials are also necessitated by the need for better controlled "field-type" experiments.

3. The estimated cost of the project is \$10,000 for a period of one year. Charges should be made against Allotment 2125-1390-3902.

4. Accounting for funds and equipment under this subproject has been established on a detailed basis with the auditor and will continue as in the past.

MEMORANDUM FOR: THE RECORD

SUBJECT : Discussion with Morgan Hall Concerning Past  
and Future Accounting for Funds.

1. The points raised in the recent audit of the Morgan Hall accounts (MKULRA, Subprojects 13, 16 and 42) were discussed with Mr. Hall in order to obtain more complete accountings where possible and to give instructions for future accountings.
2. The following points mentioned in the auditor's report are discussed in the order they are in that report, starting with paragraph 30.
3. All available receipts are now on hand in TSS/CD.
4. Bank statements and checks for the bank in New York are missing for the months of October and December 1954, January and March 1955, and for the San Francisco bank they are missing for the month 24 February to 24 March 1955. Mr. Hall states these are not in his files and he is certain they were forwarded to TSS/CD. It is not known where these records were lost. Mr. Hall will request duplicate statements from the banks. If feasible, photostats of the checks indicated in the statements will be obtained from the bank. However, Mr. Hall pointed out it is generally a major task to obtain photostats of checks from a bank.
5. A declaration of trust for the bank account in San Francisco has been signed by Mr. Hall and is on file in TSS/CD.
6. The attached written instructions were given to Mr. Hall on the submission of future accountings. He was given a number of small account books and instructed to send in one each month, together with all receipts, etc.
7. Check #053, cashed 15 April 1954, which bears the notation "Atlantic City trip", was questioned by the auditor. An approximate breakdown of the funds involved has been signed by Mr. Hall. This is the best that can be reconstructed at this date. Current instructions call for more detailed accounting for future trips.

8. Check No. 031, cashed 6 July 1954, for cab fares, household supplies, maid service, air conditioner repairs, food, liquor, was questioned by the auditor. This check was cashed to obtain cash funds for the routine maintenance of the apartment. The air conditioner repairs were made by a local repairman who was paid in cash and gave no receipt. The other miscellaneous expenses were for small amounts for which receipts were not customary or not obtained. The purposes and amount appears reasonable; however, Mr. Hall has been instructed to provide itemized breakdowns of miscellaneous expenses in the future.

9. Check 095, cashed 31 January 1955, and check 100, cashed 13 February 1955, were both questioned by the Auditor. The Auditor's report says check 095 states "cleaning (not readable); landlord; household supplies", and that check 100 states "cleaning (not readable); landlord; household supplies; cab fares". The "not readable" portion of each check was identified by Mr. Hall as "tips to" (making the complete phrase, "tips to landlord"). Both of these checks were cashed at the time the apartment in New York was being closed. In setting up the apartment in New York, the installation of special equipment involved extensive removal and replacement of woodwork and wall plaster. A "doorway" was constructed in the wall between the operational and monitoring apartments to allow visual surveillance and the testing of experimental, experimental surveillance equipment, and a "window" was constructed in a bedroom wall to permit visual surveillance techniques. In addition, other "furnishings" and "decorations" further altered the apartment. When the apartment was given up, the equipment was removed by TSS/CD and TSS/APD personnel and the damage was repaired to the extent necessary to hide the nature of the operations. It was felt the remaining alterations, etc., such as the opening between the two apartments, could be explained by Mr. Hall's original cover story to the landlord. However, it was obvious that more than reasonable reconditioning would be needed by the landlord to prepare the apartment for a new tenant and that it would be best that the landlord accept some changes as permanent. Negotiations between the landlord and Mr. Hall were conducted on an informal basis, and the "tips to landlord" were to clear up any difficulties about the alterations and damages, to facilitate release from the lease, and for extra efforts on the part of the landlord to obtain a new tenant to take over the unexpired lease. No receipts were involved. The "cleaning" portion was related to preparing the apartment for transfer back to the landlord. Mr. Hall has been instructed that expenses are to be itemized in the future, rather than grouped together.

34. Lease for the East Coast apartment was effective 1 Jun 53 at a rental of \$235 per month for a period of 26 months ending 30 Sep 55. The status of the lease, the amount paid, and the amount still due, if any, could not be verified because of missing paid checks, lack of receipts and lack of knowledge when the apartment was vacated. It is understood that the lease was cancelled with the loss of only one month's rent represented by an advance deposit made at the time of executing the lease. The records show 18 additional payments have been made of \$235 each. Three other checks may have been issued for Oct and Dec 54 and Jan 55, if so, this would indicate the apt was vacated as of 31 Jan 55. Facts regarding the financial status of the lease should be ascertained.

35. Check issued to [redacted] for \$20.58 is not explained or otherwise supported.

36. Three adding machine tapes totalling \$62.80 were submitted, presumably for expenditures, but there is no explanation or identification as to date or purpose.

37. An insurance certificate showing \$25 premium on shipment of household effects was submitted but no evidence is available that it has been paid.

38. Recommendation - In addition to explaining and rectifying the above deficiencies, it is recommended that quarterly accountings be obtained; the starting balance should be \$2,901.62, all cash received and paid out, and the balance on hand should be shown; each check issued or cash paid out should be dated, itemized and supported by a receipt or sales invoice or explanation of why such support cannot be submitted; bank statements and paid checks should be submitted quarterly and a periodic report should be rendered on the use of liquor, i.e., whether given away or consumed. More than a thousand dollars has been spent to date on liquor with no record as to its necessity or use. The accountings and reports should be signed by the chief of the division indicating his approval of all appropriate expenditures.

1. The purpose of this subproject is to continue the mechanism for reimbursing [REDACTED] for personal services rendered TSD/CB. These services include special consultations in [REDACTED] lectures, briefings, participation in planning sessions, and participation in and reporting of certain professional meetings and conferences. The specific areas of study which [REDACTED] will give special attention are the following:

- (a) Developing a classification of natural drinking situations (bars and cafes) in [REDACTED] and vicinity which has wide applicability.

(This is a development from pilot studies started in 1956 with more organized studies in 1958 and 1959.)

- (b) Continuation of bartender interviews previously reported, with the goal of obtaining a more representative sample and obtaining the additional information available from interviewing techniques that have improved with experience.
- (c) Developing methods for study of bar and tavern clients with the aim of using this field station as a natural focus for personality and situational appraisal and prediction. This work has been in progress since 1956 but has those manifold difficulties of a relatively unstructured, uncontrolled situation.
